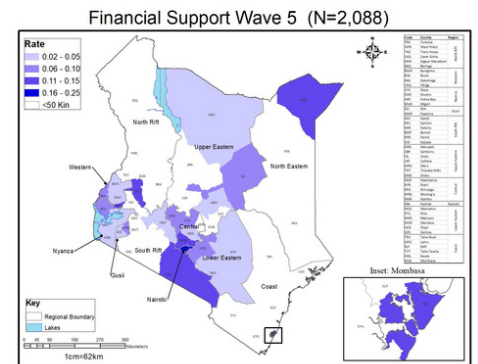
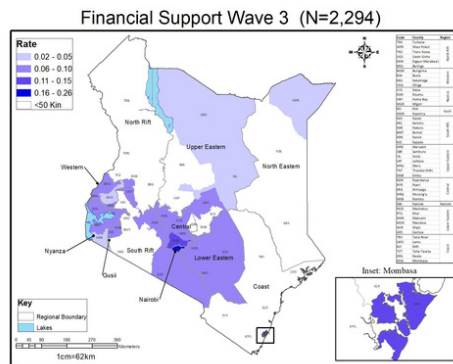
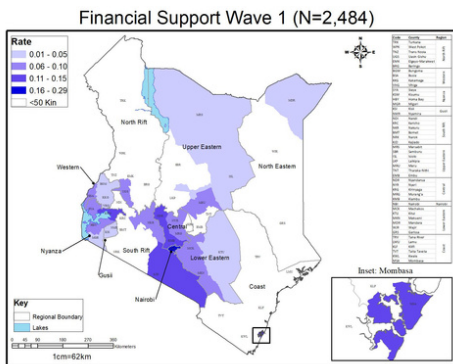
The JAMO project studies the extent to which kinship support and marriage benefit mothers and children in low income, urban African settings. The study consists of six waves of surveys and three rounds of qualitative data collection in two low-income communities in Nairobi, Kenya. The starting sample includes 1,203 mothers aged 18–29 with a child aged 0–24 months.

WHERE DO KIN LIVE AND WHAT DO THEY DO?

Introduction by



Kin are concentrated around Nairobi, in Lower Eastern, Gusi and Western Kenya. There is some change over time with fewer kin in Lower Eastern region



Financial support comes from only a small number of kin who are concentrated around Nairobi, in Kajiado, Kisumu and Mombasa. This is mostly stable over time except for an increase in support from Mandera county in Wave 5.
